We have conducted a compliance audit of the Bigler Township Volunteer Firemen's Relief Association (relief association) for the period January 1, 2023, to December 31, 2024. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; Section 403 of The Fiscal Code, 72 P.S. § 403; and the Volunteer Firefighters' Relief Association Act ("VFRA Act"), see 35 Pa.C.S. § 7418.

The objective of the audit was to determine if the relief association complied with applicable state laws, contracts, bylaws, and administrative procedures as they relate to the receipt of state aid and the expenditure of relief association funds.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objective identified above and was not, nor was it required to be, conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Relief association officers are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the relief association's administration of state aid and accumulated relief association funds complies with applicable state laws, contracts, bylaws, and administrative procedures, including the safeguarding of assets. Relief association officers are responsible for complying with applicable state laws, contracts, bylaws, and administrative procedures. It is our responsibility to perform procedures to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to the extent necessary to satisfy the audit objective. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our conclusions.

Based on our audit procedures, we conclude that, for the period January 1, 2023, to December 31, 2024, the relief association, in all significant respects, complied with applicable state laws, contracts, bylaws, and administrative procedures as they relate to the receipt of state aid and the expenditure of relief association funds.

The contents of this report were discussed with the management of the relief association. We would like to thank the relief association officials for the cooperation extended to us during the conduct of the audit.

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#### **BACKGROUND**

Pursuant to Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Section 403 of The Fiscal Code, and the Volunteer Firefighters' Relief Association Act ("VFRA Act"), the Department of the Auditor General's duty is to audit the accounts and records of every volunteer firefighters' relief association to determine that funds received under the Foreign Fire Insurance Tax Distribution Law, commonly referred to as Act 205, are properly expended.

The relief association is a charitable organization that was formed primarily to afford financial protection to volunteer firefighters and to encourage individuals to participate in volunteer fire service.

The VFRA Act governs the overall operation of volunteer firefighters' relief associations. Relief association bylaws define the specific operational procedures by which relief associations conduct business. To fulfill its primary purpose, the VFRA Act authorizes specific types of expenditures and prescribes appropriate volunteer firefighters' relief association investment options. Within the parameters established by the VFRA Act, it is the responsibility of relief associations to choose investments in a proper and prudent manner.

Volunteer firefighters' relief associations receive public tax monies, and the relief association officers therefore have a responsibility to the public to conduct the relief association's financial affairs in a businesslike manner and to maintain sufficient financial records to support the propriety of all relief association transactions. Volunteer firefighters' relief association officers are also responsible for ensuring that the relief association operates in accordance with applicable state laws, contracts, bylaws, and administrative procedures.

Act 205 sets forth the computation of the Foreign Fire Insurance Tax Distribution paid to each applicable municipality throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The amount of the distribution is based upon the population of each municipality and the market value of real estate within the municipality. Upon receipt of this distribution, the municipality must allocate the funds to the volunteer firefighters' relief association of the fire service organization or fire service organizations that is or are recognized as providing the service to the municipality.

During the current audit, relief association officials indicated that as a result of financial and manpower constraints, the relief association is considering dissolution and merger with another volunteer firefighter's relief association. Prudent business practice dictates that relief associations contemplating dissolution should consider retaining legal counsel to provide assurance that the dissolution complies with applicable laws and regulations governing non-profit charitable organizations and that all benefits owed to active and former association members are maintained and protected. In addition, if dissolution is expected, the remaining relief association members should conduct a meeting to approve the dissolution of the relief association and the disposition of its assets. In most circumstances, all relief association-owned monetary assets and equipment of the dissolving relief association are to be transferred to the new relief association that is established as a result of the merger. In addition, relief association officials should contact this Department regarding a final audit of the relief association and perform the following:

- Complete a physical inventory of all relief association-owned equipment, including a listing of equipment that is to be transferred to the recipient relief association.
- Provide full documentation of the monetary assets and equipment being transferred to the recipient relief association.
- Obtain a signed receipt from the relief association receiving the monetary assets and equipment to verify the transfer of assets. Transferred monetary assets and equipment become assets of the recipient relief association. All transferred equipment should be added to the recipient relief association's equipment roster.

If a merger occurs, we will verify the receipt of the monetary assets and equipment transferred through an audit of the recipient relief association. However, as of the date of this report, the relief association has not made a formal commitment to dissolve and merge with another relief association.

Based on the relief association's records, its total cash and investments as of December 31, 2024, were \$14,179, as illustrated below:

Based on the relief association's records, its total expenditures for the period January 1, 2023, to December 31, 2024, were \$20,364, as noted below. The accuracy of these expenditures was evaluated as part of the Department's audit to conclude on the relief association's compliance with applicable state laws, contracts, bylaws, and administrative procedures as they relate to the receipt of state aid and the expenditure of relief association funds. The scope of the Department's audit does not include the issuance of an opinion on the accuracy of these amounts.
