# Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan

We have conducted a compliance audit of the Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan pursuant to authority derived from the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (Act 205 of 1984, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.402(j)), which requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to audit every municipality which receives general municipal pension system state aid and every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system state aid is deposited. The audit was not conducted, nor was it required to be, in accordance with Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. We planned and performed the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives.

#### The objectives of the audit were:

- 1. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the findings contained in our prior report; and
- 2. To determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objectives identified above. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the findings contained in our prior report, we inquired of plan officials and evaluated supporting documentation provided by officials evidencing that the suggested corrective action has been appropriately taken. To determine whether the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, our methodology included the following:

- For the period January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2024, we determined whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements by verifying the annual deposit date of state aid and determining whether deposits were made within 30 days of receipt.
- · For the period January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2024, we determined whether annual employer contributions were calculated and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations by examining the municipality's calculation of the plan's annual financial requirements and minimum municipal obligation (MMO) and comparing these calculated amounts to amounts actually budgeted and deposited into the pension plan as evidenced by supporting documentation.
- · For the period January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2024, we determined that there were no employee contributions required by the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations.
- · For the period January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2024, we determined that there were no benefit calculations prepared.
- We determined whether the January 1, 2023 actuarial valuation report was prepared and submitted by March 31, 2024 in accordance with Act 205 and whether selected information provided on this report is accurate, complete, and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program by comparing selected information to supporting source documentation.

The Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan participates in the Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement System (PMRS), which is an agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system that acts as a common investment and administrative agent for participating municipal pension plans. PMRS issues a separate Annual Comprehensive Financial Report, copies of which are available from the PMRS accounting office. PMRS's financial statements were not audited by us and, accordingly, we express no opinion or other form of assurance on them.

Township officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. As previously described, we tested transactions, interviewed selected officials, and performed procedures to the extent necessary to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objectives.

The results of our procedures indicated that, in all significant respects, the Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies for the periods noted above, except as noted in the following finding further discussed later in this report:

Finding – Partial Compliance With Prior Recommendation – Receipt Of State Aid In Excess Of Entitlement

The accompanying supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis. We did not audit the information or conclude on it and, accordingly, express no form of assurance on it.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of Clarion Township and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report. We would like to thank township officials for the cooperation extended to us during the conduct of the audit.

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#### **BACKGROUND**

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 et seq.). The Act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans.

Annual state aid allocations are provided from a two percent foreign (out-of-state) casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign (out-of-state) fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes including, but not limited to, the following:

- Act 15 Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement Law, Act of February 1, 1974 (P.L. 34, No. 15), as amended, 53 P.S. § 881.101 et seq.
- Act 69 The Second Class Township Code, Act of May 1, 1933 (P.L. 103, No. 69), as reenacted and amended, 53 P.S. § 65101 et seq.

The Clarion Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan is a single-employer cash balance pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Ordinance No. 1-2019, as amended, and a separately executed plan agreement with the plan's custodian effective January 1, 2020, adopted pursuant to Act 15. The plan was established May 15, 1981. Active members are not required to contribute to the plan but may optionally contribute an amount not to exceed ten percent of compensation to the plan. The municipality is required to contribute ten percent of compensation. As of December 31, 2024, the plan had three active members and four retirees receiving pension benefits.

### CLARION TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED PENSION PLAN STATUS OF PRIOR FINDINGS

### Compliance With Prior Recommendation

Clarion Township has complied with the prior recommendation concerning the following:

Failure To Maintain An Adequate Record-Keeping System To Effectively Monitor Activity
Of The Pension Plan

For the period subject to audit, the township provided annual financial statements of transactions of the custodial account of the pension plan.

### Partial Compliance With Prior Recommendation

Clarion Township has partially complied with the prior recommendation concerning the following:

· Receipt Of State Aid In Excess Of Entitlement

On September 28, 2021, the township returned \$211, plus interest, to the Commonwealth for the excess state aid received in the year 2018. However, plan officials again failed to reconcile the amount of state aid allocated to the non-uniformed pension plan with the plan's annual pension costs in 2021, 2022, and 2023, as further discussed in the Finding and Recommendation section of this audit report.

### CLARION TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

# <u>Finding – Partial Compliance With Prior Recommendation - Receipt Of State Aid In Excess</u> <u>Of Entitlement</u>

Condition: As disclosed in the Status of Prior Findings section of this report, the township partially complied with the prior recommendation by reimbursing \$211, plus interest, to the Commonwealth for the excess state aid received in the year 2018. However, during the period subject to audit, plan officials again failed to implement procedures to reconcile the amount of state aid received by the township with the plan's annual pension costs. The township again received state aid in excess of the non-uniformed pension plan's pension costs in the years 2021, 2022, and 2023, as illustrated below:

In addition, as of the date of our audit fieldwork completion, the excess state aid remains in the township's general fund and has not been deposited into the pension plan.

Criteria: Section 402(f)(2) of Act 205 states:

No municipality shall be entitled to receive an allocation of general municipal pension system State aid in an amount which exceeds the aggregate actual financial requirements of any municipal pension plans for police officers, paid firefighters or employees other than police officers or paid firefighters maintained by the municipality, less the amount of any aggregate annual member or employee contributions during the next succeeding plan year, as reported in the most recent complete actuarial report filed with the commission.

<u>Cause</u>: Plan officials again failed to establish adequate internal control procedures to reconcile the township's state aid allocation with the plan's actual pension costs.

<u>Effect</u>: It is this department's opinion that because the entire proceeds of the insurance premium tax on foreign casualty insurance companies are distributed annually to each eligible recipient municipality, it is inappropriate to use state aid in one year to offset pension costs in other years. Consequently, the overpayment of state aid in the years 2021, 2022, and 2023 must be returned to the Commonwealth for redistribution.

### CLARION TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

### <u>Finding – (Continued)</u>

Furthermore, the township's future state aid allocations may be withheld until the finding recommendation is complied with.

Recommendation: We recommend that the municipality return the \$3,745 of excess state aid received in the years 2021, 2022, and 2023 to the Commonwealth. A check in this amount, with interest compounded annually from date of receipt to date of repayment, at a rate earned by the plan, should be made payable to: Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and mailed to: Department of the Auditor General, Municipal Pension & Fire Relief Programs Unit, 321 Finance Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120. A copy of the interest calculation must be submitted along with evidence of payment.

Furthermore, we again recommend that, in the future, plan officials reconcile the township's annual state aid allocation and municipal contributions made to the pension plan with the plan's annual pension costs and reimburse any excess state aid received to the Commonwealth.

Management Response: Municipal officials agreed with the finding without exception.

<u>Auditor Conclusion</u>: Due to the potential withhold of state aid, the township's compliance with the finding recommendation will be monitored subsequent to the release of the audit report and through our next audit of the plan.

# CLARION TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED PENSION PLAN POTENTIAL WITHHOLD OF STATE AID

The finding contained in this audit report cites an overpayment of state aid to the township in the amount of \$3,745, plus interest. A condition of this nature may lead to a total withholding of state aid in the future unless the finding is corrected. A check in this amount with interest, at a rate earned by the pension plan, should be made payable to: Department of the Auditor General, Bureau of Municipal Pension & Liquor Control Audits, 314 Finance Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120.
