# North Belle Vernon Borough Police Pension Plan

We have conducted a compliance audit of the North Belle Vernon Borough Police Pension Plan pursuant to authority derived from the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (Act 205 of 1984, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.402(j)), which requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to audit every municipality which receives general municipal pension system state aid and every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system state aid is deposited. The audit was not conducted, nor was it required to be, in accordance with Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. We planned and performed the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives.

#### The objectives of the audit were:

- 1. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the finding contained in our prior report; and
- 2. To determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objectives identified above. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the finding contained in our prior report, we inquired of plan officials and evaluated supporting documentation provided by officials evidencing that the suggested corrective action has been appropriately taken. To determine whether the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, our methodology included the following:

- · For the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023, we determined whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements by verifying the annual deposit date of state aid and determining whether deposits were made within 30 days of receipt.
- · For the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023, we determined whether annual employer contributions were calculated and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations by examining the municipality's calculation of the plan's annual financial requirements and minimum municipal obligation (MMO) and comparing these calculated amounts to amounts actually budgeted and deposited into the pension plan as evidenced by supporting documentation.
- For the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023, we determined whether annual employee contributions were calculated, deducted, and deposited into the pension plan in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations by testing total members' contributions on an annual basis using the rates obtained from the plan's governing document in effect for the years in the period noted and examining documents evidencing the deposit of these employee contributions into the pension plan.
- For the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023, we determined that there were no benefit calculations prepared.
- · We determined whether the January 1, 2023 actuarial valuation report was prepared and submitted by March 31, 2024, in accordance with Act 205 and whether selected information provided on this report is accurate, complete, and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program by comparing selected information to supporting source documentation.
- For the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023, we determined whether the terms of the plan's unallocated insurance contract, including ownership and any restrictions, were in compliance with plan provisions, investment policies, and state regulations by comparing the terms of the contract with the plan's provisions, investment policies, and state regulations.
- · We determined whether transfers were properly authorized, timely, and appropriately recorded by plan officials by examining supporting documentation for one transfer made during the period January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2023, and through the completion of our fieldwork procedures.

North Belle Vernon Borough contracted with an independent certified public accounting firm for annual audits of its basic financial statements which are available at the borough's offices. Those financial statements were not audited by us and, accordingly, we express no opinion or other form of assurance on them.

Borough officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the North Belle Vernon Borough Police Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. As previously described, we tested transactions, interviewed selected officials, and performed procedures to the extent necessary to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objectives.

The results of our procedures indicated that, in all significant respects, the North Belle Vernon Borough Police Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies for the periods noted above, except as noted in the following finding further discussed later in this report:

Finding – Noncompliance With Prior Recommendation – Reimbursement Made From Pension Plan Funds Resulting In Minimum Municipal Obligation Deficiency

The finding contained in this audit report repeats a condition that was cited in our previous report that has not been corrected by borough officials. We are concerned by the borough's failure to correct this previously reported finding and strongly encourage timely implementation of the recommendation noted in this audit report.

The accompanying supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis. We did not audit the information or conclude on it and, accordingly, express no form of assurance on it.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of North Belle Vernon Borough and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report. We would like to thank borough officials for the cooperation extended to us during the conduct of the audit.

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#### **BACKGROUND**

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 et seq.). The Act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans.

Annual state aid allocations are provided from a two percent foreign (out-of-state) casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign (out-of-state) fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the North Belle Vernon Borough Police Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes including, but not limited to, the following:

Act 37 - The Borough Code, Act of April 18, 2014 (P.L. 432, No 37), Chapter 11, Subchapter F Police Pension Fund in Boroughs Having a Police Force of Less Than Three Members, as amended, 8 Pa. C.S. § 1131 et seq.

The North Belle Vernon Borough Police Pension Plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Ordinance No. 539, pursuant to Act 37, for police officers hired prior to August 12, 2014. The plan is also affected by the provisions of collective bargaining agreements between the borough and its police officers. The plan was established February 2, 1966. Active members are required to contribute five percent of compensation to the plan. As of December 31, 2023, the plan had one active member, no terminated members eligible for vested benefits in the future, and one retiree receiving pension benefits from the plan.

# NORTH BELLE VERNON BOROUGH POLICE PENSION PLAN STATUS OF PRIOR FINDING

### Noncompliance With Prior Recommendation

North Belle Vernon Borough has not complied with the prior recommendation concerning the following as further discussed in the Finding and Recommendation section of this report:

· Reimbursement Made From Pension Plan Funds Resulting In Minimum Municipal Obligation Deficiency

### NORTH BELLE VERNON BOROUGH POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

### <u>Finding – Noncompliance With Prior Recommendation – Reimbursement Made From</u> <u>Pension Plan Funds Resulting In Minimum Municipal Obligation Deficiency</u>

Condition: As disclosed in the prior audit report, although the borough partially complied with a prior audit recommendation by returning the overpayment of state aid received in 2015 to the Commonwealth, the borough withdrew \$978 for the reimbursement from the pension plan assets which created a deficiency in the 2015 minimum municipal obligation (MMO) which had previously been fully paid through the deposit of state aid and municipal contributions.

<u>Criteria</u>: As stated in the prior two audit reports, the borough used the overpayment of state aid to pay the MMO due to the police pension plan; therefore, if the reimbursement to the Commonwealth were to be made from the pension plan, the plan's MMO would not be fully paid.

<u>Cause</u>: Plan officials again failed to establish adequate internal control procedures to ensure compliance with this department's prior audit recommendation.

<u>Effect</u>: An MMO deficiency could result in the plan not having adequate resources to meet current and future benefit obligations to its members.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We again recommend that the municipality pay the \$978 MMO deficiency for the year 2015 to the police pension plan from the borough's general fund, with applicable interest. A copy of the interest calculation must be maintained by the borough for examination during our next audit of the plan.

Management's Response: Municipal officials agreed with the finding without exception.

<u>Auditor's Conclusion</u>: We are concerned that the municipality has not complied with the prior audit recommendation and encourage compliance at the earliest opportunity to do so.

#### NORTH BELLE VERNON BOROUGH POLICE PENSION PLAN SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION (UNAUDITED)

The comparability of trend information is affected by changes in actuarial assumptions, benefit provisions, actuarial funding methods, accounting policies, and other changes. Those changes usually affect trends in contribution requirements and in ratios that use the actuarial accrued liability as a factor.

Analysis of the dollar amount of the actuarial value of assets, actuarial accrued liability, and unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability in isolation can be misleading. Expressing the actuarial value of assets as a percentage of the actuarial accrued liability (Column 4) provides one indication of the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis. Analysis of this percentage, over time, indicates whether the system is becoming financially stronger or weaker. Generally, the greater this percentage, the stronger the plan.
